#### What is an Annual Parish Meeting?

A chance for the Parish Council to explain what it has been doing in the last 12 months and what's planned for the next 12 months or so. Also it is an opportunity for representatives from local bodies and organisations to talk directly to residents and you, as a resident, to question what is going on in the village.

#### Who Can Attend?

Anyone and everyone is welcome to attend.

#### Will I be able to ask questions and make comments?

Yes. Not only will your views be welcomed but also it is precisely why the meeting is held. Raise anything you feel is important or needs saying.

#### Who will be there?

By law, the Parish Council Chairman will lead the meeting. Parish Councillors will be there plus your District and County Councillors, however, they are mainly there to listen and take note. Minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on 29 February 2024 at 7.30pm held in the Village Hall, Cockfield.

In Attendance: District Cllr Paul Clover, 4 Members of Public and the Clerk.

#### 2023/200 Apologies for Absence:

Suffolk County Cllr Robert Lindsay, District Cllr Margaret Maybury, Cllr Andy Golding, Cllr Ralph Turner and Steven Coughlan (Community Police Officer).

#### 2023/201 Declarations of Interest

Cllr Cutting-Keyton declared a Non-Pecuniary Interest in Agenda Item 8.2 Payments, as treasurer of the WI, who are the recipients of a cheque from the Parish Council.

#### 2023/202 Minutes of the Last Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council

It was proposed by Cllr Cutting-Keyton and seconded by Cllr Knight that the minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council, held on 25 January 2024, be signed as a true record. The proposal was carried.

#### 2023/203 Outstanding Actions:

2022/178: Pavilion Balustrade: No progress since last meeting.

**2022/184.1: Reduced Speed Limits:** Cllr Levett to draft Options paper (Agenda Item 10). (Action Closed)

**2023/104.2: BMSDC Clirs Report: Planning** Clir Cutting Keyton advised that the Planning Consultation Group met with a representative from SCC Highways on 14<sup>th</sup> February. The Representative outlined SCC Highways position on the development, and subsequently confirmed that the Triangle was classified as 'Highway'. (Action Closed)

**2023/135.2.1: Safety Sign on Great Green:** The Clerk confirmed that Cllr Turner had procured two small Safety Warning signs for the Village Green and will meet with the Greens Committee representatives to agree where to site them.

**2023/146.2: Babergh District Cllr Report:** Suffolk County Cllr Lindsay previously confirmed that SCC Highways trial use of Glycosulphate alternatives to control weeds had not been successful and new recommendations were to be submitted to SCC's Cabinet on 27<sup>th</sup> February. In Cllr Lindsay's absence, there was no further update.



**2023/148.3: Parish Council Investments:** Cllrs Levett, Cutting-Keyton, Morley and Golding to furnish proof of identity at Cambridge Building Society before the Parish Council can open a Deposit account. (Agenda Item 8.3).

**2023/153: Community Shop & Post Office:** Cllr Fletcher to provide an update to the 28<sup>th</sup> March Parish Council Meeting on the Cockfield Village Group's progress in purchasing the Plough & Fleece Pub and will supply details of their Business Plan for the future of the Pub as a long-term location for the Post Office & Shop

**2023/188.2: Precept:** BMSDC have acknowledged Cockfield's Precept Application and confirmed 1<sup>st</sup> instalment will be paid in April 2024. **(Action Closed)**

The Clerk has provided feedback to the Windsor Green resident. (Action Closed)

**2023/194: Jeffreys Green Signage:** Cllr Morley to present estimates for signage options at the 28<sup>th</sup> March Parish Council Meeting.

**2023/195.2.1: Greens Management:** Cllr Brinkley confirmed that Cargate Ltd would be visiting Great Green on 4<sup>th</sup> March to pump out the drainage sump. **(Action Closed) -** The Clerk to pursue pricing options from Vertas Group Ltd.

**2023/195.2.2: Glebe Land:** Cllr Levett has issued renewal notices to existing Allotment holders and 6 have already renewed. **(Action Closed)**

#### 2023/204.1 Suffolk County Councillor's Report:

Cllr Lindsay circulated his report to Cllrs in advance of the meeting. In Cllr Lindsay's absence there was no further update.

#### 2023/204.2 Babergh District Councillor's Report:

Cllrs Clover/Maybury's joint report was circulated to Cllrs in advance of the meeting. Cllr Clover encouraged the PC to respond on BMSDC's consultation proposal to introduce car parking charges in Lavenham, Sudbury and Hadleigh (Agenda Irem 15). Cllr Clover also highlighted the increasing flooding problem and the need for increased maintenance.

#### 2023/204.3 Public Participation Session:

A resident raised the issue of damage to the bridge at the end of Old Hall Lane and confirmed that SCC Highways have undertaken an inspection. Damage to Cross Green was also raised. Cllr Morley advised that this had been reported to Chambers Bus Company and was being monitored.

In Steven Coughlan (Community Police Officer covering Sudbury Rural North)

absence, this was deferred until Steven can attend a future meeting. Cllr Cutting -Keyton offered to circulate details of the Policing Model to Cllrs after the meeting.

## 2023/206.3 Request from resident for Parish Council to allow him to purchase land from SCC that was due to be transferred to the Parish Council:

The resident was in attendance and outlined his request. The Clerk outlined the potential issues of concern that the Parish Council had with the proposal and those raised in discussion with the SCC Farms Management Team. Cllrs considered the application but agreed that they couldn't support the request.

#### 2023/207.1 Financial Statement:

The Clerk outlined the Financial Statement.

#### 2023/207.2 Payments & Income:

It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Baber that the schedule of payments be approved. The proposal was carried.

Councillors authorised payments covering February 2024.

#### 2023/207.3 Building Society Account:

It was proposed by Cllr Levett and seconded by Cllr Morley that the Parish Council transfer £100,000 of Earmarked Reserves and Neighbourhood ClL from its Community Account into a new Building Society Deposit Account. The proposal was carried.

#### 2023/208 School Request:

The Clerk circulated a briefing note to Cllrs in advance of the meeting and highlighted the key issues. It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Cutting-Keyton that the Parish Council donate £500 to the All Saints School Trust under its Section 137.3 powers in 2023/24 and a further £3,000 in 2024/25 to support the refurbishment of the Library and purchase of new books. The proposals were carried.

#### 2023/209 Speed Limits on A1141:

Cllrs considered Cllr Levett's proposals paper (circulated in advance of the meeting). It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Baber that the Cllrs should pursue a speed reduction. The proposal was carried. The Clerk was asked to arrange a meeting on site with the Highways Warden to discuss the Parish Council's concerns about the current speed limits and potential safety risks.

#### 2023/210 Village Website:

**210.1:** It was proposed by Cllr Levett and seconded by Cllr Baber that the Website Working Group's Roles and Responsibilities paper circulated to Cllrs in advance of the meeting be approved. The proposal was carried.

**210.2:** Cllr Baber provided a verbal update on the migration of the website.

**210.3:** It was proposed by ClIr Baber and seconded by ClIr Levett that the quotation of £463 from OneSuffolk to migrate the website and PC Email be approved and that the Clerk should instruct One Suffolk to proceed. It was also proposed by ClIr Baber and seconded by ClIr Levett that ClIr Baber be authorised to negotiate the provision and migration of additional email accounts, and resolve all outstanding website issues and within a further budget of £500. Both proposals were carried.

#### 2023/211 Allotment Allocations:

It was proposed by Cllr Levett and seconded by Cllr Fletcher that the two plots (shortly to become vacant) should be offered to applicants on the waiting list, without an existing plot. The proposal was carried. Cllr Levett to provide potential leaseholders with tenancy agreements and secure their annual allotment fees.

#### 2023/212 Bio-Diversity Expenditure Initiative:

Cllr Levett provided a brief verbal update but agreed to defer main discussion until 28<sup>th</sup> March Meeting. Cllr Levett to circulate a briefing note in advance of the meeting.

#### 2023/213 Earls Meadow/Bruffs Line/Jeffreys Green Signage:

It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Cutting-Keyton that a budget up to £500 be authorised to purchase signage for Earls Meadow, Bruffs Line and Jeffreys Green. The proposal was carried. Cllr Morley and Cllr Turner to investigate signage options and prices and submit a proposal to the 28<sup>th</sup> March meeting.

2023/214 BMSDC Consultation Paper on Car Parking Charging Policy: Cllrs debated the BMSDC Consultation paper and highlighted their concerns. It was proposed by Cllr Levett and seconded by Cllr Morley that the Parish Council should oppose the policy. The Clerk was asked to respond accordingly.

**215.2.1 Greens Management:** Cllr Morley advised that following a resident raising safety concerns about falling tree bark from the large tree adjacent to the

playground, he had removed all the low level loose bark and had asked Stuart Bradnam to remove any high level loose bark and to monitor the ongoing situation. Clerk advised that Vertas Ltd are still outstanding to provide maintenance pricing options.

#### 215.2.2 Glebe Land: None

**215.2.3 Earls Meadow:** It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Cutting-Keyton that a budget of £70 be authorised to purchased a plaque for the School Tree planted by the village school children in Jeffreys Green. The proposal was carried. Cllr Morley advised that the Community Council have offered to pay for a Williams Pear tree for Bruffs Line.

#### 215.2.4 Cemetery: None.

**215.2.5 Playground:** Cllr Knight confirmed he had carried out the monthly play equipment inspection.

**215.2.6 Village Hall Car Park:** Cllr Cutting-Keyton and Cllr Morley to undertake a maintenance inspection.

**215.2.7 Parish Paths:** Cllr Baber has chased SCC on the repair to the Abbey footpath bridge as their deadline has now passed. Cllr Baber to provide the Clerk with SCC Highways contact details so he can contact them about the footpath from Howe Lane.

**215.2.9 Other Assets:** Cllr Morley reported that concerns had been raised with SHE French Ltd about the cracking to the Bus Shelter asphalt base. SHE to discuss with their subcontractors and respond.

Cllr Morley reported that the Earls Meadow working party had strimmed around the Bus Shelter, as a one-off exercise. It was proposed by Cllr Morley and seconded by Cllr Cutting-Keyton that the Clerk obtain an estimate from a local contractor to undertake this maintenance on a regular basis.

The Clerk was asked to speak with Ian Dowling to see if he was happy to raise a Flag for Peace above the Pavilion to commemorate the D-Day 80 event. Cllr Morley to speak to Hodge Farms to ascertain whether they were happy to light the beacon for the event.

## Cockfield W.I. Report for April

In March 2024 it was Cockfield WI's 95th birthday, however our celebrations involving a Literary lunch with a speaker to mark this special occasion were delayed until April due to the availability of the Village Hall. Our speaker was lan Anderson, who talked about his book 'The History and Natural History of Spices'

He explained about the family groups of spices, which have been used historically as medicines, are often aromatic and although found mostly in warmer climes have been valuable commodities utilized in the northern hemisphere. They were first traded by the Portuguese, then the

Dutch, followed by the British. All countries with considerable shipping resources, power and influence were able

to exploit these valuable commodities. Most are edible and add flavour but care has to be taken, as a few are toxic! The coriander and ginger families are significant. Traces and recipes have also been found from 1730 BC in Mesopotamia. Many references have been found to prove they were used as medicines by early Greek and Roman civilizations. A reference to Apicius' cookbook, where 81% of the recipes contained spices, was


found on tablets at Vindolanda in Northumberland. The Spice Trade Routes were established later.

A lot of European & North American wealth stems from the trade and the companies, such



as the East India Company, in the UK. I could include a lot of other historically important infor-





mation, but suffice to say it was a very interesting and informative talk!

The buffet lunch we had was also very enjoyable! A lovely occasion and a chance to get together. We decided to save the birthday cake until our monthly meeting, when it was cut by our member Rona.



Our April meeting was an open meeting with a 50's and 60's music theme. We were entertained by Barrie and Pete. They have been making music since the 60's and actually met when they were at junior school! It was a very entertaining and enjoyable evening.

The music was very familiar and brought back fond and poignant memories of their teenage years for many of the members. We were encouraged to join in and to dance too! Great fun

### Tips & Recipes for Seasonal Food in May

When April steps aside for May, like diamonds all the rain-drops glisten, fresh violets open every day; some new birds appear each hour we listen. Lucy Larcom

May is an ancient pagan spring festival. Traditional celebrations include dancing round the maypole and the crowning, with a floral crown, of a May queen. The 1<sup>st</sup> May actually falls on a Monday this year and is known as Workers Day & International Workers Day. It is a holiday in 66 countries too.

The weather is warming up, the days are getting longer and there is spring produce around. A great month to get into the kitchen or perhaps start to prepare the barbeque (more next month). Green vegetables and soft fruit are returning!

Top of the list in May could be asparagus, if you like it, during a relatively short season!! Jersey Royals will be available and aubergines, carrots and globe artichokes are coming into season. Peas are useful in a huge range of recipes and particularly appeal to children, who may need to be encouraged to eat green vegetables! Start to use salads perhaps as lettuce, tomatoes, peas and radishes are also coming into season.

Spring lamb is in the butchers and supermarkets and other meat too, perhaps in preparation for a barbeque (fingers crossed). Mackerel, halibut and plaice are caught now as well as salmon, tuna and crab. Berries are beginning to appear including gooseberries.

#### Asparagus, new potato and radish salad

Tip – the vinaigrette can be made ahead of time and kept in the fridge.

Ingredients for the salad 500g new potatoes 1 glug of olive oil A pinch of salt and pepper 125g asparagus spears I handful of sugar snap peas, halved lengthwise 1 handful chopped radishes 1 handful of pea shoots (if available)

 small bunch of dill, roughly chopped For the dressing
 130g crème fraiche
 tbsp horseradish cream
 tbsp olive oil, plus a little extra
 tbsp lemon juice
 tbsp cider vinegar

1 tbsp honey

#### Method

Boil the potatoes in plenty of salted water until tender

Cut in half lengthways and toss in a little olive oil and season.

Toss the asparagus in a little olive oil and season. Set a griddle pan or frying pan over a high heat. Griddle, if possible the potatoes and the asparagus until strong lines appear. Arrange all the ingredients on a serving dish and top with dill and pea shoots.

Whisk together the dressing ingredients, season to taste and drizzle over the salad. Ready to serve!

#### Smoked Mackerel and Lentil Salad

Ingredients 200g lentils, preferably puy lentils 4 sprigs parsley 1 sprig thyme 1 garlic clove, bruised 1 bay leaf 2x125g tins mackerel in sunflower oil, drained or fresh fillets! ½ red onion minced ½ yellow pepper diced Salt & pepper to taste 1 lemon, juice only 4 sprigs basil, leaves only Ear the dressing

- For the dressing
- 2 tbsp sherry vinegar
- 1 tbsp Dijon mustard
- 1 pinch salt
- 6 tbsp sunflower oil

#### <u>Method</u>

To make the lentils, place in a large pan of cold unsalted water on a high heat – add the lentils +  $\frac{1}{2}$  the parsley sprigs, thyme, garlic and bay leaf.

Bring to the boil, turn down the heat, and cook for 20-25 minutes, until al dente. Stir with a wooden spoon from time to time.

To make the dressing, beat the vinegar, mustard and a little salt together with a fork in a small bowl. Add the oil drop by drop, beating all the while until the dressing comes together. Add a few drops of water if it becomes too thick.

Drain the lentils, remove the herb sprigs and let the lentils cool until lukewarm. Mix in the dressing and leave to cool further.

Add the mackerel chunks, red onion and bell pepper. Combine well and season. Drizzle with lemon juice and scatter with parsley and basil leaves on top.

#### Pea, Parma Ham and Feta Quiche

Ingredients 500g ready-made shortcrust pastry (or home-made!) 1 tbsp olive oil 150g spring onions, thickly sliced 225g frozen (defrosted) or very fresh peas 3 large eggs 200 ml thick double cream 150 ml full fat milk 15 g mint leaves (just picked) 6 slices Parma ham (Prosciutto di Parma) 150g feta broken into 1-2 cm chunks 1 Handful pea shoots 1 pinch salt & freshly ground black pepper

#### Method


Roll out the pastry on a floured surface and use to line a 23x3cm loose bottomed sandwich tin. Leave the excess pastry hanging over the sides and prick the base with a fork. Pop on a tray and transfer to the freezer for 30 minutes.

Heat oven to 200 C/180F. Line the pastry case with baking parchment, fill with baking beans and bake for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, to make the filling, heat the oil in a frying pan over a medium heat and soften the spring onions for 4 minutes. Add the peas and cook for a further 2 minutes & remove from the heat. Whisk together the eggs, cream, milk and some seasoning in a large jug. Reserve the tips of the mint leaves for garnishing and finely chop the rest & stir into the cream mixture. Remove the beans and paper from the pastry case and return to the oven for 10-15 minutes until the pastry is golden. Using a sharp knife trim the edge. Reduce the oven temperature to 180C/160C fan. Arrange ½ the pea mix and ½ the ham over the base & top with ½ the feta. Pour over the cream mixture, then scatter with the remaining peas, ham and cheese. It will be very full! Bake for 35-45 minutes until golden and a little wobbly in the centre. Leave to cool for 15 minutes, then remove from the tin. Serve at room temperature, topped with reserved mint leaves and pea shorts.

### Garden Tips for May 2024

#### Flowers & Grasses

- Start thinning out hardy annuals which you have sown direct. This will promote healthy and strong growth.
- Trim back spreading plants like Aubrietia, Candytuft after flowering to encourage new growth.
- If Forget-me-nots are taking over remove surplus plants to prevent heavy self- seeding.
- Sweet Peas will be making good growth so you should ensure they are supported by plant support rings or tied in to canes.
- Continue to water container plants especially during prolonged periods of dry



weather. Start feeding containers with a liquid feed once a week.

- Get the children involved and sow sunflowers directly where they are to flower. They will enjoy seeing how tall they grow.
- Dahlias and Cannas can be planted out once all danger of frost has passed.
- Sow nasturtiums in pots or directly into the border. Not only are they colourful but their flowers can be used to decorate salads and their leaves have a peppery taste.
- You can direct sow poppies, cornflowers and scabious which will attract bees and butterflies in to your garden.
- One of my favourites is Nigella (Love in the Mist) which can also be sown directly. It has lovely feathery foliage, pretty flowers and interesting seed pods. Beware it does self – seed very easily.
- If you are growing lilies in pots watch out for the red lily beetle. Remove and dispose of.
- Vine Weevil larvae can be a real threat to plants grown in containers. Check out the



various chemical or preferably biological controls available.

- Divide Hostas as they are coming into growth. If you grow Hostas in containers you can apply Vaseline around the rim of the pot and this will deter slugs and snails.
- Continue pricking out seedlings and potting on to encourage the production of a healthy root system.
- Now is a good time to take cuttings of tender perennials such as fuchsia and pelargoniums (tender geraniums). Check out YouTube for a demonstration.

• Refresh permanently planted pots/containers by top dressing with fresh compost.

#### **Fruit and Vegetables**

- Protect strawberries with straw. This will help in two ways. It will lift the fruit off the ground and suppress weeds.
- Continue to earth up potatoes; simply draw the soil over the shoots to cover them again.
- Time for rhubarb crumble. Make sure you only harvest a third of the total stems at any one pick-



ing. You shouldn't cut the stems with a knife, just gently pull and they should come away from the base of the plant easily.

- If you have young fruit trees they will be putting on rapid growth so you need to ensure they are well- watered especially in dry weather.
- Hang pheromone traps in plum and apple trees to control fruit and codling moth activity.
- Check gooseberry bushes for signs of green gooseberry sawfly caterpillars and remove.
- Plant greenhouse tomatoes in greenhouse borders or grow bags.
- Thin out spinach, carrot and lettuce seedlings which have been directly sown. You should then water thoroughly.
- Protect carrots from carrot fly by covering with horticultural fleece. Planting parsley or leeks close by can also deter this pest.

#### **Trees, Shrubs & Climbers**

- Ensure that any newly planted trees are watered during any prolonged periods of dry weather. Try to use rainwater or recycled grey water if possible.
- Evergreen shrubs Prune out any frost damage branches.
- Once Clematis Montana has finished flowering prune back hard. This will ensure that the plant remains under control and encourage strong growth for flowering next year.
- Choisya (Mexican Orange blossom) once flowering has finished hard prune. Another shrub, the evergreen Viburnum Tinus can also be trimmed to maintain a good shape and encourage the formation of flowers for next year.



- Other spring flowering shrubs that should be pruned immediately after they have finished flowering are Deutzia, Kolkwitzia, Weigela and Philadelphus.
- Prune wall trained Pyracanthas by shortening new growth to about 3 inches (8cm). This should encourage increased flowering which in turn will provide a great display of berries in the autumn.
- Prune back Lilac trees and bushes once flowering is over. Initially cut back all spent flowers and then remove any crossing branches and any dieback. Remove any suckers from the



base. Mulch and apply a general fertiliser to encourage healthy growth for next year.

- Check Roses for any sign of blackspot. If detected then treat with a systemic fungicide particularly suitable for roses.
- Prune back plums and cherries. Aim to create an open centre to allow plenty of air and light.

#### Lawns

- Continue sowing lawn seed and repairing any bare patches in the early part of the month
- Feed your lawn with a high nitrogen fertiliser.
- For any brand new lawns you should wait until growth reaches 3 inches or more and then mow initially on a high setting.
- Apply lawn weed killer to established lawns this month.
- Lower mower blades to normal summer height.

#### **General Maintenance and planning**

- Clip evergreen hedges early May before bird nesting is in full swing.
- If weather dictates, control heat in the greenhouse with shade paint and automatic vents.
- Hang fly traps in your greenhouse this will help monitor and reduce whitefly and other pests.
- Feed your pond fish little and often.
- If the weather is fine and sunny blanket weed and duckweed will start to colonise the pond surface. You should remove this (a cane to hook and twist blanket weed and a child's fishing net are great for removing duckweed). Once removed lay the discarded weed at the side of your pond to allow insects and other pond inhabitants to escape and return safely back to the water.

Our next meeting is on April 15 and will be a garden visit to Windrush Farmhouse, Thorpe Morieux which is owned by the artist Mossy Kennedy.



#### Return to Lavenham

On 17 March Friends of Lavenham Airfield (FOLA) hosted Elaine Dalpiaz and her son Matthew during their visit to Lavenham. Elaine's father was a sheet metal worker with the 837th Bomb Squadron, 487th Bomb Group (H). He passed away in 2009, but he had been back to Lavenham previously and had fond memories of his time in Suffolk. Elaine and Matthew were over here in England visiting friends and spent the weekend in Lavenham. On the Sunday morning the persistent drizzle failed to dampen their spirits as the

two Johns, Cashmore and Pawsey, showed them around the technical site and one of the communal sites where many of the buildings have survived, including the mess hall, camp cinema, Officers's Club, ablution block and the Commanding Officer's Quarters. John Pawsey is our chairman, and it was his grandfather David Alston who owned Lodge Farm during the war years. The farm was right in the heart of the Technical Site on the south side of the airfield, and his mother lean and her brother and sister had special passes that allowed them to walk around the perimeter track to catch the school bus at Smithwood Green. It's thanks to





David Alston that so many buildings, including the iconic Control Tower have survived. On Sunday afternoon they were taken to IWM Duxford where they were able to see the two types of aircraft that Elaine's father would have helped to repair and maintain, these being the B-24 Liberator and the B-17 Flying Fortress. They were extremely impressed by the Counting The Cost Memorial outside the American Air Museum, which graphically illustrates the human cost of the Eighth Air Force's strategic daylight offensive on Germany and occupied Europe. For anyone wishing to follow in Elaine's and Matthew's footsteps, FOLA offers tours of the airfield on the second Sunday of June, July and August and September, starting at 10am from the assembly point at the Control Tower, and last about three hours. The cost is £10 for adults and £5 for under 16s. You can book in person at the Lavenham Hub, 2 Lady Street, or by calling **01787 249939**, Mon, Tues, Thurs, Fri 10.30am - 2.30pm, and Sat 11am - 2pm. The guides explain what happened at various stops on the tour in order to tell the story of the airfield during its short life as an operational airfield as Station 137 of the US Eighth Air Force. Tours are limited to about 18 for each tour, and proceeds from the sale of tickets and memorabilia go towards USAAF 487th Bomb Group Memorial Fund. Due to the interest in the Eighth Air Force generated by the Apple TV series 'Masters of the Air' we anticipate increased demand this year, so it's essential to book in good time to be assured of a place on one of the four tours.



The photo shows the memorial on a moonlit evening in May 2020 shortly after its construction, when the lockdown had temporarily halted its completion. It was officially opened in May 2022. Fittingly, there is now also a memorial bench alongside in memory of David. On the Sunday before Memorial Day (which this year is Monday 27 May) we will be having a short commemoration by the memorial which we hope will be attended by representatives of the USAF from RAF stations Mildenhall and Lakenheath. 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#### PEEWITS ON THE STUBBLE CRIMBLES FARM COCKFIELD

A new memoir from Felsham Farmer John Poole provides a unique view of a passing age in rural life and farming.

It provides a vivid account of growing up on a small family farm (Crimbles) during World War 11. This was an era of selfsufficiency, before electricity and water, and heavy farm work was done with horses.

Daily life was punctuated by a variety of war incidents, including buzzbombs and air crashes in the area on and around the farm.

The book provides a unique perspective on farming practice in the area during harvest 1940 made possible by the availability of aerial reconnaissance photographs from the Luftwaffe captured at the end of the war.

#### Dear friends

May is a wonderful month. We see our countryside alive with so many colours, and the promise of summer on the horizon. May is also a wonderful month in the church as we celebrate both the Ascension and Pentecost.

Ascension Day, which this year falls on 9 May, is the fortieth day of the Easter Season, and is one of the earliest Christian festivals dating back to the year 68 CE. We learn from our Bible that Jesus met several times with is disciples during the forty days after his resurrection to instruct them on how to carry out his teachings. It is believed that on the fortieth day he took them to the Mount of Olives, where they watched as he ascended into heaven.

The disciples were obviously sad to say goodbye to Jesus their teacher, but they had been promised help by Jesus before he ascended, and that help came on the day of Pentecost. This occurred ten days after the Ascension, when the disciples were sat together at the feast of Pentecost (which was traditionally a Jewish celebration of the early weeks of harvest).

There was the sound of a rushing wind and 'tongues of fire' descended on each of the disciples. These tongues of fire were the Holy Spirit and it gave the disciples the confidence to do the things that Jesus asked of them. St Peter, who had denied Jesus three times before he died, was able to stand up in front of the crowd that gathered that day and speak very eloquently about Jesus and why he had lived amongst them. About three thousand were baptised as Christians as a result!

Pentecost is often known as the 'birthday' of the Church and we will once again celebrate this event in all our services on Sunday 19 May. Do come and join us if you can! with every good wish

I've just got my first payslip from a new job, I'm slightly embarrassed to say I don't understand what all the different sections refer to. How do I know what each means and if it's correct?

Congratulations on the new job, hopefully you're settling into the new role.

There's no need to be embarrassed about not understanding your payslip. It contains lots of information which can be tricky to get your head around, but it is important to understand. Your payslip shows your pay, deductions, and tax information. All employers are required to give their employees a payslip and it's a good idea to keep them for as long as possible.

The top left corner of your payslip is where you'll usually find your employer's details. Opposite this, in the middle or top right corner, should be your details. This is also where you might find your payroll or employee number, this is what your employer uses to identify you for payroll purposes.

Next, you'll see lots of different numbers and codes. The payment date is when your pay will normally arrive in your bank account, it can be monthly or weekly and fall on any day of the month. Your National Insurance (NI) number refers to your unique number. You must have a NI number to work in the UK. It's used to make sure all your NI contributions are recorded and so you can get any state benefits you're entitled to, including state pension later in life.

Your payslip might show a tax period, the tax year starts in April and ends in March. The number here corresponds to the period in which you're being taxed, e.g., if you're paid monthly, 01 will represent the tax period in April, while 12 would mean March.

Next is your tax code. This is decided by HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) and is used by your employer or pension provider to work out how much Income Tax to take from your pay. Your tax code is made up of several numbers and a letter. The number refers to how much tax-free income you get while the letters can mean different things depending on your circumstances. You can find out what they mean on <u>www.GOV.UK</u>.

Make sure you're not on an emergency tax code otherwise you'll be taxed more than needed. Now to your pay and deductions. Gross pay means how much you've earned before anything is deducted. Deductions are amounts taken from your gross pay. Common ones include income tax, national insurance, pension, or student loan payments. Income tax is the tax you pay on your earnings to fund public services, this is something you have to pay but the amount will vary depending on your earnings. You pay National Insurance so you can be entitled to certain benefits, and it also contributes towards the NHS.

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

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#### Congregational Church Corner

We remember Ascencion Day this month, when Jesus ended His earthly ministry, by ascending back into heaven from the Mount of Olives, to take His rightful place at the right hand of God where He intercedes for us (Romans 8:34), and also prepare for us the place that He promised would be ours, for all eternity, in His heavenly home (John 14:3).

The ascension, as recorded in Acts chapter 1, was witnessed by His disciples; and after giving them His final command on earth (verse 8), He defied the laws of gravity, by rising unaided, and without any human or other intervention, into the wide blue yonder, disappearing from them into a cloud (verse 9).

The disciples, although having witnessed many extraordinary things done by Jesus, must have wondered what had happened here, and how He had achieved this extraordinary feat and, indeed, whether or not they could believe their eyes at what had happened. But "He who made all things through the breath of His Mouth" (Psalm 33:6), was not bound by the normal laws of physics, as we know them (or think we know them), and so He was well able to overcome the natural laws of nature; which He, Himself, brought into existence to regulate not only the earth but also the whole universe (Job 38:33).

The disciples were not left wondering about what they had seen for too long, however, because there were "standing by two men in white apparel" (whom we understand to be angels) who, by way of confirmation and amplification, told the disciples: "This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way as you have seen Him go" (verses 10 & 11), which confirmed the promise Jesus, Himself, made to His disciples; that although He was going away, He would come back again "to receive them unto Himself" (John 14: 2 & 3).

The promise that Jesus gave to His disciples extends, through the ages, to each and every believer today. And just as the disciples were left looking heavenwards to see Him ascend into heaven, so we should keep "watching and waiting, looking above", because one day soon He will keep His promise, and return to earth in "power and with great glory" (Matthew 24:30), when every eye will see Him (Revelation 1:7) every knee will bow (Romans 14:11) and all creation will acknowledge Him as "The blessed and only Potentiate, the King of kings and Lord of lords" (1 Timothy 6:15).

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
